Rush for ticket info brings down Web site

Ohio State football fever reached a midsummer boiling point yesterday.

Alumni wanted to know which game they had been awarded tickets to in the annual lottery. Because of a new procedure — the winners were sent an e-mail telling them to check the alumni association's Web site — thousands tried to log on at once, and the site's server crashed for a couple

"We did have an overwhelming response early (yesterday) morning," said Steve Proctor, vice president of communications for the association. "So we did have some server issues, but they were corrected shortly there-

Some who e-mailed The Dispatch took the association to task for the problem, but alumnus Matt Sensibaugh put it in perspective

"Inconvenient? Yes. Trage-dy? No," wrote Sensibaugh, who finally found out he'd gained two tickets to the homecoming game with Minnesota. "I suspect more bandwidth would help much and probably wouldn't cost them all that much.'

Proctor reported that 35,700 members were successful in gaining two tickets apiece to a home game, roughly 90 percent of those who participated. There were 11,050 big winners each won two tickets to the season's premier home game, Sept. 12 against Southern California.

Because the USC game and the season opener with Navy (11,749 pairs) occur before fall quarter, more tickets were available to alumni. Otherwise, the breakdown went as follows: Minnesota (3,038), Iowa (2,942), Illinois (2,621), New Mexico State (2,193 pairs) and Wisconsin (2,121).

Investigators still looking for motive in McNair case

Tennessee's state medical examiner said yesterday that investigators have been hesitant to conclude that **Steve** McNair's girlfriend killed the NFL star and herself because she didn't appear to have a motive, but that murdersuicide is the most likely scenario.

After the couple was discovered shot to death Saturday, police were quick to label McNair's death a homicide. He had been shot twice in the head and twice in the chest, but 20year-old Sahel Kazemi was dead from a single gunshot to the head. Under her body was a gun she had purchased less than two days before the killings.

Investigators were waiting on ballistics tests on the weapon before issuing a ruling on Kazemi's death, which medical examiner Bruce Levy said could come in the next few days. Kazemi's gun purchase is a strong indication that she was responsible,

"If we had known on Sunday about the gun I think we would have been very comfortable in ruling murdersuicide," he said. "I'll be very surprised now if they rule it isn't.'

• Yahoo Inc. and the NFL Players Association have reached a settlement over the use of players' statistics, photos and other data in Yahoo's popular online fantasy football game, but details were not released.

Santa Clara, Calif.-based Yahoo sued the NFLPA last month in U.S. District Court in Minnesota, claiming Yahoo shouldn't have to pay royalties to use the data because the information is already publicly available.

BASKETBALL

U.S. women's team advances at World University Games

The United States women's basketball team advanced to a medal semifinal of the World University Games with a 115-78 victory over Czech Republic in Belgrade, Serbia. Ohio State's **Jantel Lavender** had 10 points, eight rebounds and four assists.

Connecticut's Tina Charles led all scorers with 20 points for the U.S.

The Americans will play Australia (4-1) on Thursday. Russia (5-0) meets Czech Republic (4-1) in the other semifinal.

• Talor Battle of Penn State scored 17 points and made a three-point goal to give the United States the lead for good, and the Americans edged Serbia 68-66 in men's basketball at the World University Games.

Da'Sean Butler of West Virginia had 12 points for Team USA, which held on despite making 1 of 6 free throws in the final 15 seconds.

Evan Turner of Ohio State had two points and one rebound in 14 minutes. The Americans meet Bulgaria in a medal-round quarterfinal Thursday.

• Ohio State point guard Samantha **Prahalis** will play for Team USA in the Under-19 World Championships July 23-Aug. 2 in Bangkok, Thailand.

Utah lawmaker wants federal investigation of BCS system

Utah Sen. Orrin Hatch urged the Justice Department to investigate college football's Bowl Championship Series for what he views as violations of antitrust laws.

Hatch made the comment after conducting a standing-room-only hearing in the Senate subcommittee with antitrust oversight, where he serves as the top Republican.

'Frankly, there's an arrogance about the BCS that just drives me nuts," he told reporters. He said that the BCS violates antitrust laws

Justice Department spokeswoman Gina Talamona said: "We're aware of his request and will respond as appropriate."

• Kentucky Derby- and Preaknesswinning trainer Rick Dutrow was suspended for 30 days for violating doping rules.

The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission issued the suspension more than a year after tests revealed that Salute the Count had an excessive amount of Clenbuterol in his blood after finishing second in a race at Churchill Downs the day before he won the Derby with Big Brown.

• Cameron Wilson of Rowayton, Conn., shot an opening-round 4under-par 67 to lead the boys division at the Nationwide Insurance Junior tournament at Ohio State's Scarlet Course. Lindsey Weaver of Scottsdale, Ariz., has the girls division lead

"I'm so young," said Wheelwright, who played in three games in his first season with the Ravens last year, "I'm not too much older than some of the high school guys. Some of them have seen me play, so they know, 'He's still going through some of same stuff we're going through. He's been there, so I can talk to him and get some

advice.' Pro athlete-led camps are not uncommon — Wheelwright said he talked to half his Ravens teammates for advice on how to run one - so it's no surprise that those athletes who have made it big, but not necessarily the biggest, are coming home.

It's about helping their communities, they say, and about giving young athletes something they can't get from just watching on TV.

"I think (the kids will) realize that we're just normal people just like anyone else," Quinn said. "We put our pants on one leg at a time, and we lead really normal lives for the most part.'

I flipped a few pages deeper and found a 1976 drawing of reliever Pedro Borbon, who had just shaved his head. Rose is in the background with that hideous pageboy haircut saying, "That looks like a baseball; I think I'll hit it." The accompanying copy explains that "Pete would have knocked it into the right-center gap. But Bor-

bon, a tough guy with a rock for a head who once shredded a New York Mets cap with his teeth, wouldn't have felt it." Dirty Rat, the grungy little creature that sat yapping at the bottom of many of Dowling's cartoons, offers, "Rubber arm, matching head.' Get the, uh, picture?

In large part, the book explains the relationship many reporters have had with Rose. He is a likable character and a great source of copy, one whose 4,256 hits merit his election to the Baseball Hall of Fame. But if there were a Human Being Hall of Fame, he wouldn't be allowed in the parking

Dowling lampooned those flaws in his drawings and they're all here. A



Flip to another page and there is Rose in a Little Boy Blue outfit, a sack of money in one hand and the other hand outstretched to a nice lady answering the door, whose arm says "Owners." The 1982 cartoon is titled "Trick or Pete" and the lady says, "er, aren't you getting a little old for this?' The caption explains that Rose was 'still trying to pass himself off as a

youngster, kept pulling this trick of asking any owner who'd like to donate another contract so he could add a few more hits.'

The early part of the book is flattering to Rose and the later parts not so much so, which isn't surprising considering the direction his life took after his gambling habits were revealed during his term as Reds man-

It also explains why Rose willingly had his photo taken with Dowling — "cartoon man," he called him – when Rose was in Cincinnati for the Big Red Machine Reunion in November 2008. Dowling showed him the book and said he "only looked at the early part, when the drawings were more flattering."
Rose hasn't had a chance to see the

one-page addition Dowling has planned for the next printing, which closes with a story by former Cincinnati wire service reporter Norm Clarke, now a gossip columnist in Las Clarke says Rose slapped him in a

restaurant for writing in his book 1.000 Naked Truths that the hit king was a terrible tipper. The Cartoon Man had better have

an iron jaw.
